
MISSION



CHARLOTTE PARENT, RN, BSN, MHCM

Charlotte Parent, RN, BSN, MHCM, has more than 30 years of experience in health care, most recently serving as Vice President Business Development and Community at University Medical Center. She has also served as the Assistant Vice President of Community Services for LCMC Health. From 2014-2016, she served as Director of the New Orleans Health Department. While in her role as New Orleans Health Director, she was instrumental in the development and implementation of the city's smoking ban and initiatives related to homelessness, domestic violence, and sexual assault. She has also served on various boards and committees both locally and nationally.

Early in her career, she was the director of Maternal and Child Services at Touro Infirmary in New Orleans, where she developed and oversaw services for expectant mothers and their families. A native New Orleanian, Charlotte, received her Diploma of Nursing at the Charity Hospital School of Nursing, a Bachelor of Science in Nursing at Loyola University and a master's degree in health care management from the University of New Orleans.

Rev. Dr. Demetrese Phillips is the Senior Pastor at Senior Pastor at Historic St. James AME Church. He received his Doctor of Ministry at Southern Methodist University.

SUPERINTENDENT ANNE KIRKPATRICK

Superintendent Anne Kirkpatrick is one of the most tenured police executives in the country, with over 35 years of policing experience and 20 years as a Chief of Police. A Memphis, Tenn. native, Kirkpatrick has a proven track record across a diverse number of jurisdictions for transforming police departments and reducing violent crime. Kirkpatrick most recently served as Chief of Police in Oakland, where she implemented a significant cultural change in terms of increasing police accountability and transparency, improving Procedural Justice and implementing equity-based decision-making. This cultural shift coincided with a 20-year low homicide rate and a decrease in non-fatal shootings during her tenure.

Prior to her tenure in Oakland, Kirkpatrick served as Bureau Chief in Chicago, where she was the liaison to the Department of Justice (DOJ) while the Chicago Police Department was under investigation for patterns and practice of civil rights violations, resulting in a consent decree. Kirkpatrick also served as Chief of Police in the cities of Ellensburg, Federal Way and Spokane, all in the State of Washington, as well as serving as Undersheriff of the King County Sheriff's Office. In addition to executive leadership experience, Kirkpatrick is a National Instructor for the FBI's Law Enforcement Executive Association's Leadership Training Program, where she instructs on topics including, but not limited to, Bias and Diversity, Emotional Intelligence and Leading Generations.

JA'RYAN BERRYHILL

Ja'Ryan Berryhill is a dedicated youth leader, advocate, and changemaker from New Orleans. As the Chairman of the Juvenile Justice Committee on the Mayor's Youth Advisory Council, he works to elevate the voices of young people in conversations around reform, equity, and opportunity. Ja'Ryan has presented at community events, advised elected officials, and sat in on legislative sessions and committee hearings at the Louisiana State Capitol to ensure youth perspectives are represented in policymaking.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMISSIONER TENISHA STEVENS

Commissioner Stevens' work with the Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice Coordination (OCJC) promotes an accountable, efficient and effective criminal justice system in Orleans Parish. Under Commissioner Stevens' leadership, the City of New Orleans has secured over \$26 million in grant funding, including two congressional community project funding requests to expedite local accreditation of the crime lab and address community violence. Commissioner Stevens has also played a pivotal role in the development of the city's violence reduction strategy by restoring of the Police Department's Victim and Witness Division, championing Pre-Trial Services at Criminal District Court, building the infrastructure to establish a Youth Assessment Center, and transforming antiquated justice technology with a \$35 million American Rescue Plan Act investment.

Prior to joining Mayor Cantrell's administration in 2018, Commissioner Stevens dedicated more than 20 years of public service to the New Orleans Police Department, the Louisiana Attorney General's Office and the Orleans Parish District Attorney's Office. Commissioner Stevens received her master's in criminal justice from Southern University at New Orleans. Her memberships include Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.'s New Orleans Alumnae Chapter, the National Association of Blacks in Criminal Justice, the Criminal Justice Policy Advisors Network, the National Criminal Justice Association and the International Association of Chiefs of Police. Commissioner Stevens also serves on the following boards: New Orleans Children and Youth Planning, Dillard Center for Racial Justice, Total Community Action, New Orleans East Hospital, Covenant House New Orleans, and the Dryades YMCA. She is the devoted mother to Maddie, a college sophomore.

CHRISTOPHER JAMES

Christopher James is a member of the Social Justice and Well-being team with the W. Haywood Burns Institute. Chris is working to reduce racial and ethnic disparities in adult and youth justice systems nationwide. He comes to the Burns Institute with the hopes of directly engaging system stakeholders on behalf of communities of color, which are all too often not given a voice in response to a system in which they are overrepresented. He brings a background of direct legal representation of students recommended for suspension and expulsion throughout the Greater New Orleans area.
