

## Reason for Variance between City and Organization Proposal Level of Funding for 2018

	CNO PROPOSED	OPJC Proposed	Difference
City of New Orleans	\$2,740,642	\$2,840,021	\$99,379

The reasons for differences are twofold:

<u>City of New Orleans Appropriation (\$71,878)</u>— In 2016 several positions were added to the Court's budget at a pro-rated cost for ODAP and EMP. The increase to the Court's 2017 budget and now the 2018 budget does not allow for the full annual cost to fund those positions. The CAO's office was notified of this variance on October 24, 2016.

<u>City of New Orleans On-Behalf Payroll (\$27,501)</u> – The increase in payroll expense is attributable to changes in personnel in 2017 and other factors affecting staff current rate of pay.

- Data driven decisions toward improving FINS as a program that helps youth and families to stay out of the juvenile justice system.















## Positive Impact of Participation In Men Engaging in Leadership Opportunities Works (MELOW)







**"Suzie"** is a Courthouse (Trauma) Facility Dog....a trained service dog that senses emotions and responds by rubbing her head on you, resting her head in your lap, or getting as close to you as possible. These behaviors, combined with the natural calming effect dogs have on people reduces the anxiety of stressful situations or traumatic events. Suzie works on cases like this every day where children are hurting in unexplainable ways.

Suzie is a special gift for children of juvenile court. She helps them move beyond healing. Orleans Parish Juvenile Court is the first Juvenile Court in the State of Louisiana to have a Facility Dog Program. It is our pleasure to share Suzie with you and your friends.









#### **DRUG COURT**

- The Orleans Parish Juvenile Drug Court Program is a treatment –centered system that assists juveniles with substance abuse problems and their families in leading productive, substance e-free and crime-free lives. The program offers intensive rehabilitative services in a structured and supportive environment.
- The Orleans Parish Juvenile Drug Court Program provides individualized substance abuse treatment, in-home individual and family counseling services and intensive supervision.















## Positive Impact of Participation in Electronic Monitoring Program (EMP)

#### **2018 GOALS**

- Protect public safety and reduce juvenile delinquency by developing in each youth individual responsibility and accountability;
- Community engagement to inform citizens of the work, processes and functions of the juvenile court;
- Seek and develop opportunities to participate initiatives that coincide with the mission and vision of the juvenile court to provide a court of excellence that effectively and efficiently handle cases;













## MAJOR CHALLENGES... 2018 AND BEYOND

#### 1. Transportation

- Many families must utilize public transportation to access the Juvenile Justice Center.
- Currently the closest public transportation is over 6 blocks from the with no walkable sidewalk and no shelter from inclement weather.
- This is often identified as a barrier that prevents youth and families from making court or program appearances.

#### 2. Raise the Age Preparation

- 499 youth were arrested for minor offenses in 2016
- 2018 will see an influx of cases from a new population of youth
- Proper planning and preparation is necessary to be ready to accommodate the increased workload.
- 3. Sufficient Staffing to meet the growth of the Court
