Subject: Curbside Electric Vehicle Chargers

To Whom it May Concern:

On January 21, 2015, the Algiers Point Association Board of Directors agreed that it wants Algiers Point to become an environmentally conscious neighborhood and favors ways to reduce harmful vehicle emissions. To that end, it considered the desirability of curbside electric vehicle chargers. Currently such chargers are not permitted at curbside but only at driveways.

The Algiers Point Association Board of Directors voted to support the installation of privately and publicly owned curbside electric vehicle chargers. Therefore, we urge the New Orleans City Council to draft and adopt, with neighborhood input, a city ordinance that permits the installation of curbside electric vehicle chargers for properties that lack a driveway.

Minutes of Meeting of September 15, 2016

In Attendance were: Rob Booms, Ralph Bradshaw, Skip Gallagher, Vlad Ghelase, Toni Leming, Leann Logsdon, Tricia Sperier, Marty Stroble, and Mike Verderosa. Absent were: Leighton Barrett Strong, Kelsey Foster, Virginia Hebert, Paul Langenwalter, Jan Matney, and Heather Shields.

Presentation by Mike Bertel: Mike Bertel updated the Board on his firm's Atlantic/Patterson single-family residential development, which is in the final stages of the permitting process. Vlad made the suggestion that the homes be Electric Vehicle (EV)-ready. Mr. Bertel expects to break ground by the end of the year. He is hosting a Happy Hour at the Old Point Bar on September 22, 2016 from 6-7 PM to discuss the development and answer questions. He asked the APA board to help publicize the event.

Minutes: The minutes of the August 18, 2016 board meeting were approved.

Treasurer's Report: Available funds total \$28,202.59. The CapitalOne360 account yielded \$16.97 in interest last month. There was one new membership and a donation of \$300. The disbursement for annual report filing associated with the creation of the Algiers Point Foundation totaled \$15. The report was approved.

Jim Baird and Toni Leming, co-chairs of the annual Algiers Point Home Tour, told the board that the tour booklet highlighting the business and individual sponsors would cost considerably less this year. Lining up the sponsors and assembling the booklet necessitated a change in dates from October 1-2 to October 22-23. The change was approved.

Planning & Zoning: The committee reported on the January 2016 study of short-term rentals (STRs) commissioned by the City Planning Commission (CPC). The report outlined several distinct types of short-term rentals, including whole-house short-term rentals where the owner does not reside on the property. The APA Board will examine the text of the CPC's response to the study and vote via e-mail whether or not to align with the City Planning Commission's recommendations to the New Orleans City Council. If the City Council has not yet voted on STRs by the next APA board meeting, members will continue the discussion.

Events: *Movies on the Point* will resume on September 17th. *The Algiers Point Home Tour* will be held the weekend of October 22nd and 23rd from noon to 5:00 PM, with the last tickets sold at 4:00 PM. of each day. The annual *Night Out Against Crime* event will be held on October 18th at Mt. Olivet Church. The APA will sponsor the *Officer of the Month* recognition at the October APAC meeting.

Jazz Walk: The APA renewed the request for funding (\$2,500) to the National Park Service (NPS) for the lantern panes containing biographies of the jazz musicians.

Safety: A request was made to the Fourth District on behalf of the neighborhood to send out Blue Light patrols as a response to a number of home and business burglaries. The patrols have begun. At the August board meeting, members approved expansion of the APA neighborhood grant program for exterior home video cameras. Skip will provide the technical requirements so that individuals may apply for \$150 grants that can be used toward either the installation of a Project NOLA camera or a system of the homeowner's choosing.

International School of Louisiana: Procedures have been implemented by the school to address the neighborhood's concerns over parking by ISL parents on lawns, in illegal areas, and in ways that block street access.

Leadership Conference: Rob continues to work on setting up an Algiers Point Leadership Conference to bring together Executive Directors and Presidents of Algiers Point organizations to discuss cooperation and subjects of mutual concern. He will invite the Algiers Development District (ADD), Confetti Kids, the Algiers Economic Development Foundation (AEDF), Friends of the Ferry, Old Algiers Main Street, and other organizations.

APA Website: It was suggested that a disclaimer be included on the page listing green and other companies that their inclusion does not represent an endorsement by the APA. The website will continue to feature Algiers Point businesses free of charge. The Membership Committee will invite businesses to join the APA as business members.

Master Plan Proposals: Vlad shared with the board his proposed amendment to the Master Plan removing legal barriers to the installation of Electric Vehicle (EV) charging stations on private property. Board members voted to lend APA support to the proposed amendment, with the exception of Mike Verderosa, who voiced opposition for historic and aesthetic reasons.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:50 PM.

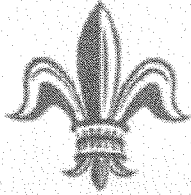

Proposed Amendments to Volume 2, Chapter 12: Resilience: Living with Water and Natural Hazards and Chapter 13: Environmental Quality

The Office of Resilience and Sustainability recommends significant revisions to Volume 2, Chapter 12: Resilience: Living with water and natural hazards and Chapter 13: Environmental Quality. Since the writing of the Master Plan in 2010, the City of New Orleans and the Southeast Louisiana region have made significant strides towards planning for a safer, more equitable, and more resilient city and region. These planning efforts have been documented in the 2012 Louisiana Coastal Master Plan (and draft 2017 update), the New Orleans Hazard Mitigation Plan 2015 Update, the Greater New Orleans Urban Water Plan (2013), and the City's first ever resilience strategy, *Resilient New Orleans: Strategic actions to shape our future city* released in August 2015. The following proposed amendments to Volume 2, Chapters 12 and 13 reflect the research and recommendations of these documents.

EQUITY

Equity is integral to any credible resilience strategy. The enhancement of environmental quality and justice through targeted investments in natural resources and improved ecosystem services is a cornerstone of the Master Plan element for resilience. To ensure citizen guidance, the resilience strategy will also empower our community to adapt to a changing environment and future threats. This element will work toward ensuring that New Orleans is prepared for future disasters and ready to carry out an efficient, comprehensive, and equitable recovery. Moreover, it will advance improving environmental quality, increasing resource efficiency, and spurring economic growth through the mitigation of our climate impact.

RESILIENCE

This principle must link existing inequities in the distribution of environmental benefits and burdens in the city and reducing risk for the most vulnerable populations who have the fewest resources available to mitigate the impacts of disasters and climate change. This Master Plan element will also encourage retrofitting existing building stock to increase energy efficiency and use of renewable energy sources, and prioritize these sources for new development and the reduction of greenhouse emissions.

Recommended amendments to Chapters 12 and 13:

- Delete Chapter 13: Environmental Quality
- Change the title of Chapter 12 to Adapt to thrive: Environmental stewardship, disaster risk reduction, and climate change
- In order to align with the visions and actions outlined in the City's resilience strategy, *Resilient New Orleans*, replace all of the goals, strategies, and actions in Chapter 12 with the following goals, strategies, and actions:

GOAL 1: A healthy, functioning coast that sustains communities, industries, and ecosystems while providing critical flood protection as part of a Multiple Lines of Defense strategy

TARGET: increase in protection level [ask CPRA to advise]
